Alfred Nobel, geboren am 21. Oktober 1833 in Stockholm, war ein schwedischer Erfinder und Unternehmer, bekannt vor allem für die Entwicklung der Dynamit-Formel. Trotz seines Erfolgs im Bereich der Explosionstechnologie war Nobel auch ein Mann der Wissenschaft und Literatur. Nach seinem Tod im Jahr 1896 hinterließ er sein Vermögen, um den Nobelpreis zu stiften – eine Anerkennung für außergewöhnliche Leistungen, die der Menschheit zugutekommen.

Die Gründung des Nobelpreises

Im Testament von Alfred Nobel, das er 1895 verfasste, wurde festgelegt, dass sein Vermögen in den Nobelpreis investiert werden sollte. Ziel war es, Persönlichkeiten zu ehren, die durch ihre Arbeit die Menschheit vorangebracht haben. Der erste Nobelpreis wurde im Jahr 1901 verliehen, fünf Jahre nach Nobels Tod.

Die Kategorien des Nobelpreises

Ursprünglich wurden fünf Hauptkategorien ins Leben gerufen:

- Physik
- Chemie
- Medizin oder Physiologie
- Literatur
- Frieden

Später kam noch die Kategorie Wirtschaft hinzu, die 1968 von der Schwedischen Reichsbank gestiftet wurde:

- Wirtschaftswissenschaften (Sveriges Riksbank Nobel Memorial Prize in Economic Sciences)

Verleihung und Auswahlprozess

Wer nominiert die Preisträger?

Nur bestimmte Personen und Organisationen sind berechtigt, Kandidaten für den Nobelpreis vorzuschlagen. Dazu gehören:

- Professoren und Wissenschaftler an anerkannten Universitäten
- Mitglieder früherer Nobelpreisträger
- Vertreter bestimmter Akademien und Organisationen
- Fachleute in den jeweiligen Disziplinen

Das Auswahlverfahren

Der Ablauf der Preisverleihung ist streng geregelt:

- Einreichung der Nominierungen meist bis Ende Februar
- Prüfung durch spezielle Komitees in den jeweiligen Fachbereichen
- Empfehlung der Preisträger an die Nobelstiftung
- Endgültige Entscheidung und Bekanntgabe im Oktober
- Feierliche Zeremonie am 10. Dezember, dem Todestag von Alfred Nobel

Die Bedeutung des Nobelpreises

Internationale Anerkennung

- Nobelpreis für Physik

- Nobelpreis für Chemie

Hier werden innovative Forschungen gewürdigt, die chemische Prozesse, Materialien oder Technologien revolutionieren.

- Nobelpreis für Medizin oder Physiologie

Diese Auszeichnung ehrt bedeutende Beiträge zur Medizin, die Krankheiten verstehen, behandeln oder heilen.

- Nobelpreis für Literatur

Der Literaturpreis würdigt herausragende literarische Werke, die das menschliche Verständnis, die Kultur oder die Sprache bereichern.

- Friedensnobelpreis

Der Friedensnobelpreis ist wohl der bekannteste und wird an Personen oder Organisationen vergeben, die sich um Frieden, Konfliktlösung oder Menschenrechte verdient gemacht haben.

- Der Wirtschaftsnobelpreis (seit 1968)

Obwohl er nicht offiziell im Testament von Nobel erwähnt wurde, wird der "Preis der Wirtschaft" vom Schwedischen Zentralbank im Gedenken an Nobel gestiftet und jährlich vergeben.

Der Auswahlprozess: Wie werden die Nobelpreisträger bestimmt?

Nominierungen und Vorschläge

- Wer kann nominieren?: Akademiker, frühere Preisträger, nationale Preisgerichte, Universitätsprofessoren und andere autorisierte Personen.

- Vorschlagsfrist: In der Regel bis Anfang Februar eines jeden Jahres.

- Vorschläge: Müssen umfangreich begründet und dokumentiert sein.

Auswahlkomitees und Jury

- Physik und Chemie: Die Nobelkomitees der Schwedischen Akademie der Wissenschaften.

- Medizin: Die Karolinska Institutet in Stockholm.

- Literatur: Die Svenska Akademien.

- Frieden: Das Norwegische Nobelkomitee, das vom norwegischen Parlament (Storting) bestimmt wird.

- Wirtschaft: Der Schwedische Zentralbank, der den Preis vergibt.

Entscheidungsfindung

- Die Komitees prüfen die Vorschläge, führen Gespräche mit Experten und treffen eine Entscheidung.
- Mehrere Runden der Diskussionen und Abstimmungen können notwendig sein.
- Die endgültige Entscheidung wird im Oktober bekanntgegeben, die Preisverleihung findet im Dezember statt.

Die Nobelpreisverleihung: Ein bedeutendes Ereignis

Die Zeremonie

- Datum: 10. Dezember, Gedenktag des Todes von Alfred Nobel.
- Ort: Stockholm, Schweden (außer Friedenspreis, der in Oslo, Norwegen, verliehen wird).
- Ablauf: Empfang, Reden, Verleihung der Medaillen und Diplome, festliches Bankett.

Die Bedeutung der Preisverleihung

- Weltweite Aufmerksamkeit: Die Verleihung ist ein globales Ereignis, das Medien und Öffentlichkeit anzieht.
- Förderung der Botschaften: Preisträger nutzen oft die Plattform, um auf wichtige Themen aufmerksam zu machen.
